Dear friends

It is a privilege and a pleasure to finally be able to write to you. While for many of you I am a new face, you have been on my mind for quite some time.

My journey started in university. My Honours dissertation was based on the life of a man baptised in the Old Parish in the 19th century. I was aware of the ministerial vacancy from the start and my focus intensified upon visiting the church during Open Doors Day 2014, when I had just started my Probationary period in St. John's. At the time I thought "there is absolutely no way this charge will still be vacant when I'm available to apply"!

I was acutely aware of members of the congregation engaged in joint events in the town, such as St. John's Friendly Hour. I was thrilled when I was invited to preach at the joint communion service in March. As the day drew near when I might be able to apply, I could barely dare to believe that the opportunity would not be snatched away. I applied at the start of August and it would be nearly two months of interviews and preaching before the Nominating Committee would be satisfied that I was the man for the congregation. A further two months would pass before, with your agreement, I would be inducted. And so we begin a new chapter in the life of the Old Kirk, together.

When we think of new chapters, new starts and new things we perhaps think of the New Year, or the season of spring. Our minds turn to lengthening nights, ewes' expectant with lamb, greenery and buds. Yet, in the moment of newness there are so many unanswered questions about how the immediate future will look and how the environment might change. All we know are the dark nights, pregnant with possibility, teasing us with potential.

It is fitting, then, that I begin my ministry and preaching at the start of advent. We reflect on another scene over two thousand years ago, another dark night, pregnant with the Lamb of God, teasing the world with potential. What would he bring to his hearers and his hearers' hearers? Generation after generation would pass as the Gospel of Christ took root throughout the world and eventually reached the town of Hamilton. Moving on, generations would worship together as the collegiate congregation. Ministers would come and go, passing the baton, which is the privilege of serving the congregation and telling the story of Christ, from one to another. Together, this story and this Christian life would be shared in the parish, bursting with potential in every generation. However, what of this generation?

What is the future for this congregation, this parish, this town, this generation? How will the congregation and the individuals within it develop in the near future, far future, and eternal future? We are currently in the dark, pregnant with possibility, teased with great potential.

There is a past, a present, a future, and this is a congregation that links all three. I have studied the past, I stand in the present carrying the baton with you, and I look forward with excitement at this developing chapter as together we share the ministry of God in Hamilton.

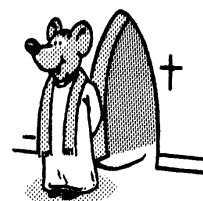

A Few Personal Words of Thanks

Norman, by the time this issue of Tidings hits the streets the daily challenges, trials and tribulations of ministering to the folks of The Old Parish as our Interim Moderator and Locum Minister should be starting to fade from your memory. Therefore I thought it might now be appropriate to say a few personal words of thanks to you as you begin your well-earned rest.

To say you were Press ganged by Bill Wilson and me into becoming our Interim Moderator would not be a distortion of the truth. Nevertheless you approached your duties with commendable energy, enthusiasm and commitment. If that wasn't enough you also agreed to be our Locum Minister throughout the term of our vacancy, no matter how long or short that was to be. On Sunday 11 October, after around 18 months, our vacancy came to a very satisfactory conclusion and The Old Parish is now on the verge of beginning a new chapter in its life and witness under the very capable stewardship of Ross Blackman.

Vacancy or Nominating Committees, as they are now known, can be notoriously difficult to moderate given that they are usually drawn from a wide cross section of our congregation and therefore comprise a whole host of different individuals and personalities ranging from the most helpful and acquiescent to the downright stubborn and inflexible. Only they and their Chairman, Alistair Buttery, an embodiment of all of those qualities, know where they individually stand within that range!!

I make these comments, as you've no doubt guessed, with my tongue stuck firmly in my cheek! There is in fact no doubt whatsoever that we are in our present happy position, not just because of all their hard work, but also because of your leadership, guidance, encouragement and wise counsel throughout your time as our Interim Moderator.

As Locum Minister your professionalism and personal commitment to our spiritual welfare and well-being were second to none. Your Services of Worship were consistently inspirational and your fastidious attention to visiting those in care, the elderly and housebound and those in hospital more often than not stretched your contracted 2 days or so and a Sunday into 7 days. I'm told that your hospital visits were so timeous that you were often at bedsides before the hospital doctor's first consultation with the patient.

As for me, it's been said that Session Clerks are a breed apart in many ways and relationships between them and their ministers can sometimes be a tad strained. However I can safely say that in my 15 years as a Session Clerk both here and in Larkhall, St Machan's I have never so consistently enjoyed working with anyone as much as I have with you. Time after time I've gone home from the church office with my sides sore from laughing and yet throughout your stewardship the business of our church was dealt with thoroughly, professionally and above all meticulously.

We now know that the date of your forthcoming surgery is to be the 8 December. So as you prepare for and undergo that short period of enforced retirement please do so confident in the knowledge that Alison and I and indeed everyone in The Old Parish will be holding you and Anne within our thoughts and prayers throughout. In the meantime we will all be looking forward very much indeed to continuing our friendship with you and having you both back to visit us in the not too distant future.

Norman you were and are a sheer joy and pleasure to know and to work with and I will miss but treasure your support and that very special relationship we had enormously. May God hold you and your family in the palm of his hand and bring you joy, peace and love now, over Christmas and in the coming years together.

Finance

Following Louis' article in the June magazine regarding the projected deficit for the year, a few people have increased their offerings, however this has been offset by a fall in other offerings. For the first eight months of this year the income from Weekly Freewill Offering envelopes, Standing Orders, annual offerings and the open plate has fallen over the same period last year. We are very grateful for two big donations which leaves the overall position almost on a par to last year. Which means the projected deficit has not reduced. We will be looking at a Stewardship campaign in some form in the New Year, however you do not have to wait for that to increase your giving, this can be done at any time. If you pay by standing order you can go into your bank and ask them to increase your standing order, do it online if you have that capability or speak to me and I can give you a form to complete.

We are continuing to look at ways to cut back expenditure too. As previously advised this will be the last full paper issue of Tidings. The magazine can now be found on the church's website www.hamiltonoldparishchurch.org however if you have no access to the internet then please let your elder or Andrea know so a paper copy can be issued to you. These will be mainly in black and white to cut down on printing costs. 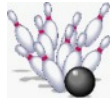
Company Section

He was a man of great faith and vision, and the Brigade is the oldest - and still the best - uniformed youth organisation and worldwide movement advancing Christ's Kingdom among boys.

Thanks are due to the congregation for your co-operation with the Service, especially those of you who had to decant downstairs for the Battalion to occupy the gallery.

We are grateful especially to our Chaplain the Rev Norman McKee for his conduct of the Service, taking the time and trouble to research the history of Sir William Smith, and addressing his sermon to the boys themselves. The feedback from the Battalion has been extremely positive. It makes a huge difference at parades when the Minister tailors the Service to speak to the boys and hold their interest. Gold star for the Rev McKee!



World Mission

At the launch in May of our appeal for The Boys' Brigade and Church of Scotland World Mission project “**Speak Up: Speak Out,**” Graham Horne gave a very powerful presentation about bullying, and the extremely serious impact this can have on young people. The project was to raise funds for a widespread anti-bullying campaign in Trinidad and Tobago. In areas where drugs and violence are rife young people are frequently bullied and coerced into becoming members of gangs from which escape is almost impossible. The Presbyterian Church in Trinidad and Tobago run seventy two primary schools and five high schools, and the funds raised from the project will provide resources and support material to highlight the effects of bullying and help those who have been affected.

I am delighted to advise that the funds raised from our Bike Ride for the project came to £1397.20 which is a magnificent total. Thank you to everyone in the congregation and to the families of the boys for your donations and support. The funds raised will not only make a huge financial difference to the project but will also be a great encouragement to all those directly involved with delivering the material to the young people.

By raising this total we have retained again the World Mission's Company Section Trophy and the Highest National Average Trophy. What will always be foremost in supporting the projects is raising as much as possible to deliver help where it is needed most, but being presented with the trophies is recognition of the effort put in by the boys and staff, and the generosity of everyone who contributed to such a deserving cause. While the trophies may not be as good as calamine lotion hopefully they will soothe Graham Horne's memories of the bike ride and his ill-advised assault on a patch of stinging nettles.

The presentation of The Boys' Brigade World Mission cheque to the Moderator of the General Assembly, and the presentation by the Moderator of the trophies to the Companies raising the highest amounts, will be held at South Queensferry on 20 November.

Forthcoming Events

The next few weeks will continue to be extremely busy with the Company taking part in the National Table Tennis Competition, National Senior Five-a-Sides, the Battalion Badminton Competition and Battalion Drill, and several of the boys attending training courses as part of the work involved with their President's and Queen's Badges and Duke of Edinburgh Awards. Gift Aid News

As you are all aware, there is concern about our financial position and we have been seeking to raise awareness of this through magazine articles over the year. Gift Aid is a tax efficient method of supplementing our income at no additional cost to members. In order to submit the claim to HMRC Revenue and Customs, I have to record individual donations by standing order and so, month by month, I can see the changing trend in our income. In the last nine months, seven members have responded to our appeal to review their Christian giving by increasing the amount they contribute. Many, many thanks to those concerned.

However, sometimes, either because we have lost a member through death or the person moving away, I have to take names off the register and at the start of this year we lost three monthly payments. You will realise that, in effect, these losses cancel out the increased giving. On a more positive note, over the course of the year, two new gift aid declarations were signed. If anyone would like to know more about gift aid, please speak to me or contact me by telephone or e-mail.

I am sure you will hear more about our financial position elsewhere in the magazine. I only have access to the standing order figures – records of annual payments and contributions through FWO envelopes will be passed to me early in January so I can complete the claim. I will be able to give you a more detailed report in the next magazine, with the proviso that the information refers only to gift aided donations. Meantime, I would ask everyone to give careful consideration to the appeals for support from your office bearers.

Finally, I would remind everyone to let me know if you stop paying tax at any point as your donations would no longer be eligible for gift aid.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD SHOE BOX APPEAL

As I said last year, Operation Christmas Child is the world's largest children's Christmas project and is run by the Christian relief and development organisation, Samaritan's Purse. Its aim is to bring joy and a smile to the faces of countless children, who will, through no fault of their own, find themselves in the most appalling circumstances this Christmas. The project enables us to make anonymous but nevertheless very special welcome connections with these deserving children by wrapping and filling shoe boxes with great little gifts. A team of UK based volunteers then organise their transportation to Eastern Europe and Africa and their personal delivery to each child.

This year's appeal was launched at the morning Service on Sunday 20 September and members of the congregation were asked to either wrap and fill one or more of their own shoeboxes or use specially pre-decorated boxes provided by the church. A wonderful total of **254 boxes** were filled and returned to be dedicated by our Interim Moderator, Rev Norman McKee, at the morning Service on Sunday 2 Nov.

At 9.30am on Tuesday 3rd November a team from Operation Christmas Child arrived at The Old Parish to start the boxes off on the first leg of their journey, all the way to Lennoxtown!! The van driver's words said it all. 'What a magnificent effort'!

After being 'Customs Checked' the boxes will then be sealed and join thousands more boxes to begin the second leg of their journey, in a fleet of lorries, which would have been returning empty from the UK to some of the poorest areas across eastern Europe and whose drivers volunteer to fill them and deliver the boxes to distribution centres in their respective countries.

At each centre more Samaritan's Purse volunteers will then arrange the last leg of their journey and their delivery to children in a huge number of local schools, hospitals and orphanages. Some will even make it to Africa! Every effort is made to ensure the boxes remain secure throughout their journey and are delivered to each child with their original contents intact. That's the volunteers' top priority and reflects their respect for the fact that each box has been individually, thoughtfully and lovingly packed.

Finally I would like to say a personal and huge '**thank you**' to all members and friends of the congregation who filled one or more boxes and once again made this year's contribution to The Shoe Box appeal so successful. In particular I'm very grateful to:-

Andrea and her kids, Gillian, Euan, Colin and wee Stuart who made up **250** flat packed, pre-decorated boxes and all helped enormously throughout every stage of the process.

Nanette McLean and Nancy Naismith who, once again, so willingly and cheerfully acted as our 'personal shoppers' and helped those of you who wanted to contribute to the appeal but just couldn't tackle shopping for suitable items. By collecting your money and indulging in some very prudent purchasing and housekeeping they managed to fill **69** boxes!

Sandra and Bill Craig and all of their friends and colleagues from The Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service for their contribution of **22** boxes!

The Officers and boys of our BB Company who brought the boxes across to the church from the halls, the volunteers who stacked the boxes ready for collection after the Dedication Service and Jim McCartney who kept an accurate tally throughout the operation.

Lastly my thanks go to my long suffering husband who did his usual and stuck his nose into everything that was going on!!

May God bless you for your kindness and bring joy, love and peace to you and your families this Christmas.

What a lot has happened since I last wrote to you.

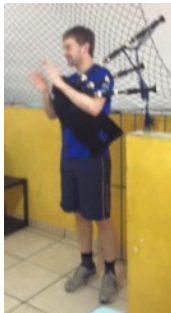
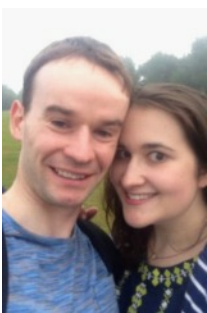

Of course it was also such a delight to be able to have the opportunity to talk at the open meeting at the Guild on Wed. 21st Oct. and to bring everyone up to speed on the ongoing missionary work of Robert & Silvana Meikle within Casa Semear in the favelas of Sao Paulo, Brazil.

The connection with the Old Parish should not be taken lightly and as always vital funds raised from the members of the congregation provide essential supplies that keep the community centre going from strength to strength.



At very short notice I informed the Guild about the new ballet class that is now teaching approximately 44 girls at different times in a basement room. The request from the dance instructor was for help in raising the £5 required for each girl to get ballet shoes and an outfit.



This all focusing on a performance at Christmas with all the girls dancing. As usual the generosity of the Old Parish knows no bounds when, between the Guild meeting and the following Sunday, you managed to donate the entire £220 in one go. Amazing. God bless you all.

I can also now confirm that Kirsty and Callum Buchan (pictured above) from St Mary's Episcopal Church in Hamilton have arrived safely in Sao Paulo, Brazil and are staying in the volunteers' flat at Casa Semear. Not only did they arrive but their 4 suitcases which were crammed full of gifts and knitting (again donated by members of the Old Parish Church) arrived as well. It is great to know that the gifts and money donated have been delivered to the children so quickly.

Kirsty and Callum will be working and supporting the team at Casa Semear for three weeks and I know they have been getting stuck in already. As like many of the volunteers before them they are documenting their visit and experiences in text and photos in an online blog. As you will see from the pictures above Callum plays the bagpipes and it looks like he has become the centre of attraction for the children. I can only imagine the wonder and amazement caused when the sound of the bagpipes is heard across the favela. I wonder what the locals will think is happening as I'm sure they will have heard nothing like it before.

Many thanks once again, your donations, support and prayers continue to change children's lives.

Safeguarding

Over the past few months, there has been a move by the Church of Scotland to raise the profile of Safeguarding and David and I have received several communications which we have had to bring to the attention of session. Our presbytery representatives had forwarded a presentation which was made to the October meeting of Hamilton Presbytery and which outlined the issues which need to be addressed. Most of these arose from deliverances by The Safeguarding Committee of the General Assembly. We were already well ahead with many of these but not all. With that in mind, we gave copies of the presentation to all elders. Here is a summary of the points raised for your information.

Our congregational register is completely up to date. All volunteers are members of the PVG scheme. However, a new version of the register has been issued and information will be transferred to the new format before the annual inspection of records early in the New Year. I will take responsibility for that with support from David.

A Safeguarding Audit Checklist has been issued and this has to be submitted with the register at the annual inspection of records. (Previously this form was used as a self-assessment tool to help congregations assess how well they were complying with guidelines.) This will be a matter for the Kirk Session to address.

All Safeguarding Panel members, Session Clerks, Ministers, Elders and volunteers on the PVG register must attend training. The responsibility for ensuring this happens lies with our Kirk Session.

The Safe Recruitment Process has to be implemented for all new volunteers. In other words, we cannot just accept an offer of help. Relevant posts have to have a job description; there has to be an interview and references have to be provided. This has implications for organisations and Kirk Session once again.

As I implied, we still have a fair bit of work to do. However, with the good will of everyone concerned, we will hopefully be able to move this forward in the coming year.
