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Dear friends,

Time is such a strange thing. I know not about you, but this year seems to have passed more quickly than any I have previously known. By the time you read this I may have been among you for about a year, and it has been an incredible year, full of highs and lows. I have had the privilege of meeting many of you, but not as many as I would have liked or had originally planned. Such are the plans of mice and men, and the vagaries of time. We will see how this next year goes.

We have had new members, new Elders, a Holiday Club for the children, baptisms and weddings. We have had a Stewardship campaign that gave all of us an opportunity to reflect on our givings, to enable our work to grow. We also have a number of exciting things to look forward to during the coming year. Among the things discussed for the future were things to improve our contact with the housebound members of the congregation, support of people with mental health needs, supporting future ministries, and taking Christ out into the streets when we host Holy Week for the town churches next year.

If there is one thing that I would like to explore it is how we might expand our worship to include the visual arts. Paul tells us that it is by faith that we walk and not by sight (2 Cor. 5:7), but we have been given all our senses to enjoy creation and glorify God. The worship in Solomon's temple was inevitably a spectacle of music, singing, and sacrifice that many believe prefigured the work of Christ. As sensate beings, we sometimes grasp a new dimension of the realities of our faith by hearing something put a different way, or with a different voice and inflection, or by what we see. In this later sense, the performing arts are way ahead of what we commonly experience in church.

To this end, it is my hope that during Holy Week, in conjunction with the other town churches, groups and schools, we might augment our services with something in the town during the day. The likely means is to perform a "Passion Play", re-enacting the events of nearly 2,000 years ago in the week leading up to the crucifixion and resurrection of our Lord. Thereby we might educate and tantalise the wider community with this section and work of Christ, and hopefully encourage them to see Christianity and church in a new light. Could you help in some manner; any manner?

If this last year has passed swiftly, how much more this last 2,000 years to the God for whom a thousand years is but a day (Psalm 90:4). Perhaps we can bridge the millennia for a new generation of Hamiltonians and pique their interest in Christ and the work of his church.

I certainly hope this has also piqued your interest.

Company 10 Pin Bowling

We joined up with the Junior Section and had our Company Section 10 Pin Bowling Night at Cosmic Bowl on 12th October. There was a good turnout and a close competition ensued. Within the Company Section the senior competition was won by Sam Walker with David Anderson second, and the junior competition was won by Euan McIntosh with Euan Davidson second. The 1st Hamilton World Champion in the officers' competition was Ross Smart. It was all good practice for the Battalion 10 Pin Bowling due to be held in November – though that competition will take place without the benefit of the bumpers!



Enrolment Service and Coffee Morning

The full Company held its Enrolment Service on Sunday 9 October 2016. It was the first Enrolment Service conducted by our Chaplain. We are very grateful to Ross for his help with organising and conducting what was a very meaningful Service of Enrolment and Dedication. After the Service we held our Coffee Morning with Baking and Craft Stalls. A huge thank you to everyone who donated baking and other items for the stalls, and who came and supported the event itself. We raised just over £500 which is a magnificent total, and this will be put to good use in funding the vital work and activities in all three sections. We are extremely fortunate to have a congregation which is so generous and encouraging of the boys, and what we do in seeking to advance and promote our Object.



World Mission

Earlier this year we launched our World Mission project with the funds to be split between the appeal to help The Boys' Brigade in Kenya, and our own Church's stewardship campaign. The last edition of Tidings included a report on the success of our triathlon. With your support, and with the support also of the boys' families and friends, we raised a tremendous overall total of £1124.20.

In Kenya the Brigade is open to boys and girls, and for many of them purchasing uniforms for themselves would be far beyond their means. The funds which have been sent to The Boys' Brigade and Church of Scotland World Mission Fund will help to pay for the material and labour costs to provide Boys' Brigade uniforms for them. To obtain a uniform each of the boys and girls will carry out ten hours of service in their communities. Across Kenya communities will benefit from the voluntary work done by these young folk.

While the principal aim of the project is to supply the uniforms, there should be other more far reaching consequences. Many young folk in Kenya cannot afford an education, or have to leave school at an early age to start work to bring in an income to help their families. For many of them the work they do is difficult and dangerous, and if they cannot earn they can often be abandoned by their families to live and beg on the streets. For these children it is a reality which we can scarcely comprehend.

The Boys' Brigade through its work in the local communities will provide a safe and caring Christian environment where children can meet and have fun, and at the same time learn practical crafts and skills which they can put into use to help themselves and their families. That may well prove to be where the heart of this year's project truly lies. With your generosity, we will have helped The Boys' Brigade in Kenya to make a difference, and to change lives. A most sincere thank you to all who contributed to such a worthwhile and hugely important cause.



Hot Off The Presses

I am delighted to report that I have received correspondence from the World Mission Committee advising that by raising this amount for the Kenyan project, we have retained again the World Mission's Company Section Trophy and the Highest National Average Trophy. While our aim is, and will always be, to raise as much as we can for the projects themselves, the trophies are well deserved for the endeavours of the boys and staff, and everyone who contributed to the project.

What makes these national trophies distinct is that they recognise and reflect a commitment by the boys to help others. It goes without saying that such a commitment is at the root of the work done by both the Brigade and the Kirk, and none more so within our own Company and congregation. In receiving the trophies we will do so not only on our own behalf, but also on your behalf as well.

The presentation to the Moderator of the General Assembly of a cheque for the total funds raised across Scotland for the World Mission project, and the presentation by the Moderator of the trophies to the various sections of the Companies raising the highest amounts, will be held at Aberdeen on 18th November. Never mind the navy - join The Boys' Brigade and see the world ! We will be there in numbers to give the boys an opportunity to meet the Moderator, and even more importantly, to give the Moderator the unique and unforgettable opportunity of meeting them!!

Finance

In 2011 The General Assembly instructed all congregations to carry out a Stewardship programme each year based on time, talents and money with the latter featuring at least every third year. Due to various circumstances, such as the union and vacancy the Old has not taken part in any Stewardship programme since 2010 so we were well overdue to carry one out. With advice from Edith Scott, a Church of Scotland Stewardship consultant, we undertook the 'Giving for Growth' programme. Two gatherings took place at the beginning of October with presentations from members of the congregation on where our money goes and the work supported by our offerings locally, nationally and internationally. There were also displays of the wonderful work undertaken by the church and its organisations. Afterwards attendees enjoyed fellowship over a cup of tea. Gift Aid News

Early in January I will be submitting the claim for the congregation for 2016. If a member has signed a declaration, then the total donated over the year is entered in a spreadsheet which is submitted electronically to HMRC. I record all the payments by standing order, the counting team enter the amounts in FWO envelopes anonymously in a register and the Finance Convener, Marilyn Henderson, keeps a tally of payments by cheque. Bill Nelson, Free Will Offering Convener, collates the figures in the register. I then gather all the figures together for processing. As you can see it is very much a team effort and the result is a very sizable contribution to church funds.

To date, I have no information about any new declarations following the stewardship campaign but I expect to be able to update you in the next magazine.

Good news is always worth sharing. The amount that can be claimed for through the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme (GASDS) has been increased to £8000. It was previously £5000. This means that the cash in the open plate can contribute to our Gift Aid income and we will receive an additional £2000 (£1250 last year). Thanks to the counting team for keeping the necessary records.

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World Mission

Being part of a world church allows us as the Church of Scotland to participate in, learn from and enjoy global community. We are able to connect with partners all over the world under the banner of faith. (Hence the reason to have the newsletter from the Meikle family in our Tidings).

Let us build a house - the World Mission Council is challenging presbyteries and congregations to raise £500 to build a house in Nepal. Five lucky volunteers from Annandale and Eskdale took up the challenge. On Friday 9 September their house was made in the car park of St Andrews Church. It was made of cardboard and the five slept in it. The weather was very windy with torrential rain. The experience was very important to them. Firstly they were only in it for one night (space 12 x 8 feet) and next morning were given bacon rolls for breakfast. Annan in September was not quite like the Himalayas in winter with 20 degrees or less.

It makes us think just how lucky we are. So far £220,000 has been raised overall and over £4000 from the above presbytery. Sandy Sneddon from World Mission is visiting our Guild in January so perhaps he can tell us more about it all.

As reported in June, we were very busy with the safe recruitment procedures for volunteers who wanted to help with the holiday club. Job descriptions, application forms and two references per person are now needed for each new volunteer, in addition to the PVG form and identity checks which we have previously had to do. Given the number of volunteers needed this was quite a task, but we are pleased to say all volunteers involved in regulated work, ie working with the children, successfully completed the process and their names have been added to the congregational register. All the relevant paperwork has been securely stored in the church office.

Training for all volunteers is now very much a priority and we have been trying to keep people informed whenever a course becomes available. It is encouraging that some have already attended courses and we have been able to organise a training event in our own church. We are really fortunate to have one of the presbytery trainers, Penny Simpson, within our congregation and we are grateful to her for her support. Organisation leaders have responded well to our efforts by talking to their personnel about training and keeping us updated about progress.
