Dear friends,

"The best laid schemes o' mice and men gang aft a-gley"



How well Burns observed the human heart and the vagaries of providence. Similarly, the bible is replete with examples of people making plans and them either going well or going catastrophically badly! Indeed, Jesus suggests that it's foolish to avoid costing out our plans (Luke 14:28). A wise person is encouraged to seek advice (Prov.20:18) yet seeking God's interests is less stressful (Matt.6:31-34), not least because God has plans to prosper his people (Jer.29:11-13).

A little over ten years ago, on instruction from the General Assembly, the then Ministries Council based in the central offices of the church at 121 George Street, Edinburgh, consulted with Presbyteries about how they might reduce the number of Ministries in the church from about 1200 to 1000. I was attending Lanark Presbytery at the time and asked the daft-laddie question: is that just a round number or is there some reasoning behind it? The emphasis was cuts. Consequently, up and down the land, there was an uproar as attempts were made to implement these plans. In Hamilton Presbytery we have only just about reached that target, with 57 Ministries for our patch.

Since then, not for the lack of innovation and trying, the numbers of Ministers, Elders, and Members have continued the slide from the high-water mark in 1959. The church is presented with the difficult choices of continuing to support the existing levels of paid Ministries and leadership or increasing its proportion of volunteer ministries. While the first few centuries of the church demonstrated how divisive a distributed leadership and scriptural interpretation could be, which was replicated throughout the Protestant Reformation, there is no doubt that there is a happy medium that needs to be sought. The workload needs to be shared, while maintaining the orthodoxy that is core to our Christian faith.

This year, in response to the Pandemic, the General Assembly established a new round of planning that once more involves cuts. It hopes to reduce to 660 Ministries but takes a different emphasis than mere cuts. With a radical re-drawing of how we operate, the focus is on Mission and how everyone can get involved in sharing the Gospel of Christ in word and/or action. It starts with the "Five marks of Mission", below, then asks what ministries are needed to support this in any given area, before concluding with the emotive question of which/what buildings to we need to support that mission. Pun not intended, but cutting to the chase, for Hamilton Presbytery that means reducing to 34 paid Ministries, and for the Hamilton and Blantyre area that could represent as few as five Ministers – and the Old Parish is as much under scrutiny as any congregation.

So, that begs the question, "What are we doing about mission as a congregation?" Perhaps we recognise our part to play in the five marks of mission, without which the kingdom of God rarely grows:

The mission of the Church is the mission of Christ

- 1. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- 2. To teach, baptise and nurture new believers
- 3. To respond to human need by loving service
- 4. To transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation
- 5. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth

To that end, the Presbytery has encouraged every congregation to enter into discussions with its neighbours to make some ground-up suggestions of the kind of sustainable options that might support mission in our area. In some ways, we're ahead of the game. We also have a small cohort of representatives willing to discuss these issues. We ought to make it a matter of prayer that God's will be done for our town and country, and that we might play our part in that, to His inestimable glory. Then, we trust, God will bless the efforts of our planning.


Guild




Saffronhall Singers




Anchor Boys
