Dear friends,

What wouldn't you give to see God working in our midst? We're not even half way through the year and already it has been a busy time. Winter did not lay fallow, but the spring certainly brought forth fresh growth. As a huge boost to Christian unity in the town, the Holy Week services brought a focus to the story of Christ, and what we do as Christians. Thanks are due to more people than we might name. I hope and trust that our evening Pentecost service, on 4th June, will also be blessed by God and have a further effect.

In our Kirk Session in May, I outlined several forthcoming congregational events that require advance preparation if they are to be achieved. Of great importance is what we do to support the children in our congregation and parish. It was agreed that we will attempt to recruit to the Boys' Brigade; and that we will once more run a Holiday Club towards the end of the summer holidays (August 1st-4th). This year the club will be called "Polar Explorers", and the children will learn about several bible characters. I would encourage you to think about your talents and how you might support this vital work in small and great ways. If you are unsure what you might bring but feel moved to help, please don't wait to be asked. Consider this a personal request, and just volunteer, and I will find a job for you. If you saw the delight on their faces, last year, you already know that the children will greatly appreciate it.

This is just one area that we can work together as a congregation at the heart of the spiritual life of our parish. I have no doubt that there are many more. Please have a think about what your own gifts and talents are. It is so easy to overlook something that God has given us for the benefit of his kingdom. After all, the mustard seed is tiny, yet Jesus used it to illustrate the power of just a little faith (Matthew 17:20). Meanwhile, Jesus also tells us, "lift up your eyes and look at the fields, for they are ripe for harvesting. Already the reaper draws his wages and gathers a crop for eternal life, so that the sower and the reaper may rejoice together" (John 4:35-36).

I leave you with this thought. During Holy Week the congregation, the churches, and the town came together. There was a tangible air of anticipation, a buzz, a movement – on the street and in the church. What wouldn't we do to have the opportunity to work with God, to glorify His name, and to be blessed by Him? As individuals and as a church, let us not pass by our chance to reap all the precious benefits of His grace. The blessings are to us and our children (Psalm 115:13-14).

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Pentecost falls on Sunday 4th June, this year. Building on the Christian unity we experienced throughout Holy Week, a joint evening service has been arranged for 6.30pm in the Old Parish. The format of the service will be similar to the Holy Week services in that a variety of the town clergy will have a role in the service and there will be a dramatisation of Pentecost performed.

The response from other churches has been extremely encouraging, with everyone keen to work together again and display that unity in the town.

In terms of the dramatic vignette, many of the cast were delighted to get back together again for a final scene, and many will reprise their roles from Holy Week. Newcomers are also welcome, so – if you were in the congregation during the Passion Play and wondered what it might have been like to be involved – now is your opportunity! Rehearsals will take place at 7.30pm at HOPC on Tuesday 9th, 16th and 30th May, with a final rehearsal after church on 4th June. Everyone is very welcome to

come along and be a part of it.

We hope you will support this additional joint service which provides us with a new opportunity to explore the birth of the Christian church, and what the coming of the Holy Spirit means in our lives today.

Stewardship and Finance

At the time of writing six months have passed since our Gatherings in October. We knew from the outset that it would be some time before we could report on the outcome of our efforts. Changes are still filtering through, however following a meeting with the Church of Scotland Stewardship Consultant at the end of March, we are now in a position to give a report on the success to date of the campaign and you can see this report elsewhere in the magazine. It will probably only be when the accounts for 2017 are produced we will see the full effect of our campaign. It does look at this stage that our offerings will be sufficient to meet the **day to day running costs** of the church for the first time in a number of years. Other expenditure such as fabric or the screens and audio equipment is all met from restricted funds which we are fortunate to have due to the sale of buildings, and does **not** come out of the offerings from members.

With effect from 1st April Nesella Barr resigned as Gift Aid Convener. Nesella held this role for many years in the North Church before taking it on in the Old at the time of the union, and I would like to thank her for all her hard work over the years and for her commitment to the finance committee in general. I have taken over this position and once I get to grips with the process I will report to you in the future.

Stewardship Success

As you know in 2016 we followed the Church of Scotland Giving for Growth Programme and implemented a Stewardship Campaign which ran for several months. The campaign finished with two successful gatherings held for members on 6th October.

This was the first Stewardship Campaign that we had undertaken since 2010. The Church of Scotland's guidance on Stewardship suggests that a givings campaign should be held every three years.

At the time of the campaign we had 495 members and adherents belonging to 358 households and on average we have 200 members attending Sunday worship.

All members were given a personal invitation to the Gatherings which were delivered to their homes by an excellent team of lady visitors.

84 members +27 participants and helpers attended the 2pm Gathering and 50 members +27 participants and helpers attended the 7pm one, a total of 161 members who responded positively. A further 52 members submitted apologies and were unable to attend for various reasons. If you add the 161 who attended the gatherings to the 52 apologies you get 213 which equates very closely to the 200 core members who attend Sunday worship regularly.

Both Gatherings contained a full programme including meaningful givings related talks, professional entertainment by the choir, outstanding shows of work by all the church organisations and finished with welcome and plentiful refreshments and a demonstration by our accomplished Country Dancing Group.

All member households were provided with a Givings Pack either at the Gatherings if they attended or delivered to their home by the team of visitors if they did not. This pack contained givings related information including response documents.

236 givings responses were received from 174 households representing around 50% of the membership.

From analysis of the responses the following information was gleaned:-

The number of Gift Aid declarations increased from 181 to 203up 22

The number of Standing Order Mandates increased from 139 to 166......up 27

The number of offering Envelopes decreased from 118 to 107......due to members switching to Standing Order.

We received 3 requests for information about legacies which was provided to the members who enquired and we also received annual or one-off donations amounting to £5,500.

Now we turn to the overall income position and the reason our Treasurer is going around with a smile on his face. Comparing the income for the months of January and February 2017 with the equivalent months in 2016 we have seen an increase in givings of around 15%.

We are hopeful that this figure of 15% will be improved upon when we are able to compare a full year's figures and the position will continue to be monitored by the Finance Committee.

While we can never be complacent about our church finances we are hopeful that the uplift in givings arising from the campaign will enable the Old Parish to avoid a deficit in 2017.

Finally, we hope you agree that the Stewardship Campaign has delivered a satisfactory outcome. Grateful thanks is due to everyone, elders and members, who worked so hard over several months to support the initiative and contributed to its success.

Queen's Badges

Queen's Badges were presented to our four senior young men: Sam Walker, Lewis McParlane, David Anderson and Struan Wilson.

The Queen's Badge is the highest award in The Boys' Brigade. It requires commitment and hard work over about 18-24 months. The boys require to attend a Candidates' Conference followed by a weekend of residential training at Boys' Brigade Scottish Headquarters. They must then complete at least thirty hours of voluntary service, develop a new or existing skill for 3-6 months, demonstrate progress in a new or existing physical activity for 3-6 months, complete a two night and three day Silver Duke of Edinburgh expedition, take on a leadership role in the Company for a full session, and finally attend and complete satisfactorily a Lanarkshire District Completion Course. The award is difficult to achieve and rightly so, since it is only gained by young men who have shown the necessary commitment, perseverance, skill, enthusiasm and character.

Our four young men richly deserve their awards. They are all thoroughly decent laddies who in addition to having all of the usual characteristics of lads of their age, have conducted themselves in the Company with great dedication, enthusiasm, integrity. In the best traditions of the Brigade by their own example they have set high standards for the younger lads to follow. We sincerely hope that they will all continue to have a leadership role within the Company. We do not want to lose young men of their quality.

All four have also gained their Silver Duke of Edinburgh Awards. Along with Fraser Ewart they now plan to embark on their Gold Duke of Edinburgh Awards.



Walk With Christ - Passion Play 2017

What an amazing Holy Week we all experienced! I suspect there are very few who could not see the hand of God blessing what the churches did together.

My own part in that, producing the Passion Play, was also richly blessed and I would like to take this opportunity to say a heartfelt thanks to everyone who supported it in any way.

In reality it takes an awful lot of willing and committed people to make something like that happen. People lent their time and talents by the bucketload to the production and it was very much the richer for the involvement of so many talented people.

Like any first time, there have been lots of lessons to learn along the way. One of these for me was the involvement of a professional actor to play Jesus. I was convinced from outset that we would need a professional actor to do the role; however I was very surprised by how

difficult it was to "find" Jesus...of course in hindsight the deeper meaning of this is crystal clear, but at the time I was completely perplexed. My own memories of being an out of work actor meant I expected to be swamped by actors wanting to take on the job... but not one CV appeared. As we carried on in rehearsals without someone in the role, however, I saw our local company strengthen and bond.

When we were initially offered the opportunity to share Edinburgh's Jesus, I was reluctant, simply because of the complexities of him being in both productions. (Again, in hindsight, what does it say that the minister's wife didn't want to "share Jesus"???!) My reluctance was completely misplaced and was wiped away as soon as he walked into his first rehearsal.

Duncan Rennie, who portrayed Jesus, has played Jesus in the Edinburgh Easter Play for several years now and was such a blessing to us. It was great to have someone so experienced in the role. Duncan was also a delight to work with and very laid back, despite working with us on something so new.

I am sure we all recognised his phenomenal talent—but for me the defining moment was the confidence with which he took to the streets of Hamilton, supported by a company who transported us back to first century Jerusalem. The younger ones also did so well on Palm Sunday, what an achievement for them. It was a very special start to the week.

The media coverage was a welcome surprise, with four main articles in the Hamilton advertiser over the course of preparations and Holy Week itself. It was great to see that the work we were doing together was capturing imaginations outwith the churches, from the very first headline which declared "Churches Unite for Passion Play". We also (thanks to Ian and Caroline Goodship) had two interviews broadcast on Revival FM. What an amazing way to get the gospel story out into our local community.

Publishing sermons on YouTube since November also set us in good stead for outreach. Each night after the service, the dramatic vignette and sermon was uploaded onto YouTube. There were more than 6,000 views on our YouTube channel in April; another amazing way of sharing the gospel! Many of you have told me how you appreciated being able to follow Holy Week back home whilst you were away, which was great to hear.

The many positive comments we received throughout the week were very much appreciated. My thanks also to those who took the time to complete the feedback forms. The results of these follow.



"What's next?" is something I am being asked regularly. Well, first of all (thanks to the help of Karen Rollins and Iain Morris) we will have screenings of the DVD of the passion play in June – keep an eye on the intimation sheets for more details. Having viewed the trailer I am now desperate to see how the film turns out. This gives us a lovely opportunity as a community to re-live (as far as possible) an amazing week.



Then, we will have Pentecost. You can see what we will be up to then in a separate article...do think about getting involved. The more the merrier.

Finally, we are looking forward to Holy Week 2018. There was clearly an appreciation of the format, i.e. having a dramatised scene as part of worship each day, however my own view is that we should not repeat the same format but take the opportunity to consolidate our learning from this year and produce a full Passion Play in the streets of Hamilton, most likely on Easter Saturday. This would be another great opportunity for the churches to work together in our local community, taking the redeeming story of the gospel into the very heart of the town.

There is clearly a lot to think about between now and next Easter, and I am always happy to hear suggestions. So, please do speak to me.

I will leave you with a sentiment I received on some beautiful flowers from the cast and crew.... "May you always 'Walk with Christ".










Walk with Christ Summary Evaluation 2017

Leading Worship Workshop

I've thoroughly enjoyed taking part in the services in Hamilton Old and look forward to this continuing. In fact, Ross has already got me pencilled in to cover while he is on holiday in July. Through time, I hope to develop my own style and introduce a couple of the things I learned on the workshop.

From the very beginning, Ross has always been there and I'll forever be indebted to him for his friendship and support. I look forward to supporting him in the coming months and I hope you'll continue to enjoy my involvement as we praise God together.




