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The flower of humanity.

No wonder, scripture likens human life to flowers (Psalm 37:2; 103:15; 2 Kings 19:26; Isaiah 40:6-8; 1 Peter 1:24; especially Matthew 6:25-34).

Three years ago, in Hamilton's first Passion Play, we set the scene for Gethsemane under a blooming cherry blossom tree in the churchyard. Footage is available on the HamiltonOld still YouTube channel. Who could have imagined that this year rehearsals would be cut prematurely short, finishing with some hurried camera recording before lockdown curtailed our usual activities? Thousands of views later, the story of Jesus still as compelling, nearly 2000 years after the original events.



We are told that Jesus lived a human life to show that God loves us, wants to be with us, and demonstrates that this short life is not all there is. He was cut down in his prime by the sin and wickedness of humankind, but God is greater than our best and worst. Whatever our experiences, this period after Easter reminds us that we are more than just flowers.

The creative team have been tasked with considering how the work might be taken online to provide a range of virtual gatherings. This will start on 19th of May when the planned bible study evening goes online. Please do support this and consider how you might like to be involved in the months ahead as we use our own fresh expression of church to bring something new to our worship.

Filming the Passion

Thanks to everyone who watched our Passion Play on YouTube this year. It was a scaled-down version of what we had hoped to present in the heart of the town, but the positive feedback we have received indicated that it still brought the story to life for us and helped us journey with Christ.

I thought you might like to hear a wee bit about those few days we had before lockdown to film the Passion – and how Hamilton Old became the backdrop for this powerful story.

It was a week of many changes. Our rehearsals had been in full swing. We had just been joined by some drama school graduates, who were joining us primarily to play roles we could not fill from the local community. We ended up very much in their debt for all their hard work alongside our Drama Kirk regulars, as you will see.

On Sunday 15th March, we were all still in church. Warnings around coronavirus were escalating and were impacting on how we lived. After church that day, our Drama Kirk Committee reviewed our plans and agreed that we should not continue to plan for a live performance but should instead focus efforts on filming as much as we could, in the hope we could still share a performance. We shared this information with the team and began to contact people we hoped could film it. We also planned our locations.

Restrictions continued to tighten; and time was against us. We realised we had to film as much as possible, as quickly as possible.

We filmed in two days. I am not sure it is possible to convey how frantic those days were. We should have had another month to rehearse – and of course build set, make costumes, bring props together. To shoehorn the activity into two days was quite a feat. I am proud of the team for all they achieved.

An important first step was building a "black box" to give us a blank canvas within HOPC against which to film. Give a thought for those who arrived at church for a 10am bible study and were roped into helping set this up...they ended up leaving church at 11pm....

I was also really worried about food. At a time when shelves were empty, how could we find enough materials for Jesus to cleanse the temple, sweeping items off the market stalls? And how could we justify taking food from the shelves to throw away? Alan Young came to the rescue and I am so grateful that Asda supplied food that was not going to be sold, so there was no waste in what we did.

Many amongst our community cast were unable to continue for a variety of reasons. We had to make significant cuts to the script to accommodate this and people played a variety of roles they have not planned to play and took on lots of lines they had not planned to say! We also had to hire an additional professional actor who astounded us all by coming in on day two of our filming to play Pilate. With an hours' notice he shaved off his beard, found the church and got on with it – never having seen the script before.

Everyone turned up when they could. Straight from work or school. It was frantic and stressful but with God's grace we got through it cheerfully and managed to film enough to tell the story. Our efforts were blessed and our play was watched by over 3,800 people over the Easter weekend. Heartfelt thanks to all who made this possible.

As far as I am aware, no other Passion Play in the UK was able to film the story. Others involved in the One Good Friday project filmed certain scenes which formed part of a documentary screened on Good Friday. It included some of our scenes and an interview with "our" Jesus as well as Ross and I. The documentary was seen by over 28,000 people on Good Friday.

We hope to be part of the One Good Friday Project again next year; when, God willing, we can take the Passion into the heart of our town.

CELEBRATING 100 YEARS PETER SHARP CONDIE



Peter was born on 19th May, 1920, the eldest son of John and Jean Condie and brother to Jim and Lottie.

He was baptized in the Old Parish Church and grew up attending St. John's Primary School in Bent Road (1927) and St. John's Grammar School in Hope Street. A very large class of pupils with Peter strategically standing beside the teacher.





Peter has always found great pleasure in singing, and in this early picture taken in April 1933 with his late sister Lottie, he was centre stage in the performance of Princess Chrysanthemum, an Operetta performed in the Parish halls.

An active member of the Life Boys and Boys Brigade of 4th Hamilton attached to the former North Church, it was there he was awarded his King's Badge. He enjoyed many years with the Company, camping and taking part in gymnastic displays.

He continues to display an enviable energy for exercise which continues with swimming and country dancing. Peter regularly swims 40 lengths at the Water Palace.

The family have always been attached to The Old Parish with Peter attending Church and Sunday School from the family pew in the right transept. At the young age of 9, he became a boy Soprano in St. Mary's Episcopal Church.

After school Peter embarked in a career as an apprentice butcher with Baxters in Quarry Street, but with the outbreak of war he volunteered for the RAF in 1939 and served for 3 years in Rangoon and Burma.





Peter lived in the Old Gate Lodge in Hamilton (now the Bentley Garage) till he joined the RAF, but his parents and Lottie lived there till 1967.

At the end of the war he returned home safely, but work was hard to find and he eventually found employment with Singers in Clydebank as a tool grinder where he met

Vera, an oxy acetylene welder and they married in 1949.

Peter's family tree soon began to grow with the arrival of three children Christine, Jean and Peter.

That tree now continues to blossom with 4 Grandchildren – Karen, Gregor, Lynne and Brian 6 Great Grandchildren – Steven, Sara, Sophie, Elliot, Nolan, and Megan



And with the arrival of Mac Steven Fraser earlier this year on the Isle of Wight, Peter has his first Great Great Grandson.



It was when Peter returned to Hamilton that he took work with the Local Authority. He was Town Officer to the Provost and Council officials till he retired in 1984.

Peter has many hobbies. A keen gardener, but foremost is singing – he is the longest serving member of the Church Choir, and still regularly takes his place in the Tenor Section. He joined the Choir in 1932.

Over the years he has enjoyed entertaining at Ceilidhs, The Festival of Remembrance in the Town Hall, and various church and community events, where his performance with his "mouthie" is well appreciated from an extensive repertoire. He attends art classes enjoying water colour painting – is a keen country dancer – and that combined with



swimming where he has tutored more than 100 children in life saving skills, keeps him trim, very fit and healthy.



Peter was ordained to the Eldership in the Church in June 1973 and although now inactive in this role, he has not retired from this office.
