For Your Information



Life is never dull for the Session Clerks at 'The Old' and as we move on from our very successful union towards a new chapter in our history it is super to see a steady increase in our membership. Bill and I are aware that many of the folks who are new to us will be unaware of the more practical aspects of attending The Old Parish so I thought I would take this opportunity to provide some guidance on a couple of our more contentious issues.



Parking

We are not blessed with the best parking facilities so we need to have some fairly tight rules. In addition we rent out 'reserved' spaces to local businesses to supplement our income and that cuts down the number of free spaces available during the week. Those spaces are used on a first come first served basis by our Nursery staff and individuals attending the wide variety of groups using our halls during weekdays and indeed at weekends. Those groups and organisations also supplement our income substantially. We do not routinely have spaces available for members who want to pop across to the shops, however if you are lucky enough to find one available then you are welcome to use it for a short time but not as an all day 'park and ride' for your trip on the X1 into Glasgow! If you are visiting the office on church business and there are only disabled spaces available then feel free to use one but only for the duration of your business. The minister's space must be kept clear at all times. We are also working towards preventing members of the public from using our premises as a free car park during the week and addressing the accompanying verbal abuse our Caretaker receives when she tries to speak to people about that and it may be that we will have to move towards more restricted entry in the future.

On Sundays we have permission to park in the bowling green spaces and on the yellow lines on the church side of Leechlee Road until 1pm, leaving the pedestrian crossing clear. In addition parking is permitted without payment until 1pm within the designated parking bays in Strathmore Road and Cadzow Street and in the Church Street car park. Parking is **not** permitted on the yellow lines at the entrance to Strathmore Road. They are there to keep the junction entrance wide enough to admit Council Utilities vehicles and more importantly Fire Service vehicles. If you park your car there you run the risk of having its side taken off by a heavy vehicle trying to negotiate the corner and you may also be issued with a ticket or worse still have your car towed away if it's causing an obstruction. Parking is not permitted on the red chipped paths around the church as access must be kept available for an ambulance if required. If you can't find a space on a Sunday there is a substantial multi storey car park just across the road in Leechlee Road which you can use for a very modest fee. Finally if you are unfortunate enough to get a parking ticket whilst parked within the permitted areas up until 1pm on a Sunday please hand it in to the office and we will do our best to have it cancelled.



Complaints/Suggestions

In a busy church like ours we are dependent to a huge extent on our rental income, the good will and hard work of our full time staff and, above all, on a whole host of volunteers who willingly sacrifice a substantial amount of their personal time to ensure that everything runs smoothly, that our premises are fully and appropriately utilised and that everything, including our equipment, is maintained to a very high standard. Much of that work goes on unseen and is carried out in addition to personal/professional/business commitments and little, if any, is done for any form of reimbursement. We are extremely grateful to everyone involved as without their selfless efforts we would be in a sorry state indeed.

Now to the crunch! Nothing in life is ever perfect and we will always encounter hiccups and problems along the road. However there is, unfortunately, a very small minority of members who repeatedly complain to the extent that we are in danger of losing the services of those individuals we rely on so much. There can be nothing more discouraging than being on the receiving end of a constant stream of complaints when you are doing your best and our aim, particularly as office bearers, should be to support and encourage rather than constantly undermine

Consequently and with immediate effect we are going to introduce suggestion boxes at the Church doors and in the office. If you have a complaint or a comment about anything that you feel is not being addressed appropriately then please feel free to highlight it in a **signed and dated note** and place it in the box. Please **do not** approach members of staff or responsible Office Bearers/ Conveners/volunteers etc. personally with any issues you wish addressed unless it's an absolute emergency or extremely urgent as you will simply be referred to the suggestion boxes. Similarly we recognise that nobody has a monopoly on good ideas or suggestions so if you have one please share it with us by popping a note in the box. Contents of the boxes will be reviewed on a weekly basis by the Minister and Session Clerks and appropriate action agreed. Your support and understanding in this regard would be appreciated.

Boys' Brigade



The Company was well represented at the World Mission Cheque Presentation at Dalziel St Andrew's Parish Church on 14 November 2014.

Ross Smart and Fraser Ewart spoke about the time spent by them out in the Czech Republic and the work being done by the project at the Comenius Camp. It was a proud moment to see two of our own lads give such an assured presentation. The assembled dignitaries were all extremely complimentary and left with a very positive view of the work being done in the Brigade both at home and abroad, and the quality of the young men coming through the ranks.

The evening included a live video link-up with a Boys' Brigade Company in Zambia playing instruments purchased from funds raised through the World Mission project run three years ago. It was great to see the joy and enthusiasm they showed for being in The Boys' Brigade and having their Company band.

A cheque for £11,000 was presented to the Moderator and this year's project was then revealed. More about that in due course.....

World Mission
Prayer Focus: Christians in Minority Situations
Christians in Gaza

We have heard many Jewish and Muslim accounts of the situation in Gaza, but so often the voice of the small Christian community is not heard.

Christians in Gaza are a small minority among 1.76 million Palestinian population and their numbers are decreasing. In 1997 the total number of Christians in Gaza was 1688 and today they number 1303. The majority are Greek Orthodox (89%), but 9.3% are Roman Catholic and 1.52% belong to other denominations.

Life for these Christians is severely limited. It will come as a shock, but Christians in Gaza have not been permitted to visit holy sites in Bethlehem and Jerusalem since 2007; key Christian sites that we can visit freely. This is having a negative impact on their ability to uphold their religious faith. Suffering due to the occupation, Christians in Gaza, as all Palestinians, aspire to freedom and an independent Palestinian state.

The WMC seeks to attentively accompany Christian communities in the Middle East on behalf of the Church of Scotland and does so through working with partner churches, the Middle East Council of Churches, supporting schools and initiatives across the region.

January has traditionally been the time for the Casa Semear Team to take a holiday. With all the increased activity at the end of the year culminating in the Christmas period, January has become a time to recharge the batteries. For Robert, Silvanna and the family it's a time to get away from Casa Semear, the city and find some quality family time of their own.



Having been in the position to witness first hand the demands on their time in a normal day, which of course doesn't fall within a 9 to 5 timescale, the only way to truly break from Casa Semear, the children, their families and the many social problems that arise daily, is to actually get away and break from normal surroundings.

You will also see from the photos that the large kitchen in Casa Semear has continued to be worked on. This is the benefit of supplying funds beyond what is needed for any specific visits, the work just keeps on going.



The photos show the walls all newly covered in large white tiles and of course cover all the new construction that has been done within the space giving the room a clean fresh look. The new black marble worktops are in place, even although at this stage the wooden cabinets have not yet been fitted. The double sinks, large cooker and the space in general looks like its being used already, which is obviously great news and will be a welcome change to the smaller kitchen in Dora's flat that was previously where all the preparing, cooking and clearing up was done.



The wooden cabinets are being specially made by another organization within the Abba family, namely "Solido Moveis", (look for them on Facebook), so this very much keeps the business and the money within Christian organizations, which is great news for everyone. It's kind of amazing to think that the funds sent are then benefiting more than just our own Casa Semear.

Caio and Dorothee (Supporters and workers with Casa Semear) have at long last been successful in adopting a child. Dorothee, pictured, who took the female teenagers group will now take some time off from Casa Semear to look after her new 7 month old son, Mikael.

Gift Aid

At the time of writing I have almost finalised the main gift aid claim for 2014 and the good news is there is a slight increase on last year's figures. Gift Aided income is £77,265.95 (£77,032.58 last year) which will result in a payment of £19,316.49 from HMRC (£19,258.15 in 2013). Please remember these figures only refer to income that is gift aided – there is other income donated by members who, as non-tax payers, are not eligible to gift aid their donations. This year I have analysed the figures in more detail as follows:

It is encouraging that even in these challenging times, our members maintain their commitment to the work of the church, local and national.

Finally, thanks are due to the counting team who record the figures week by week and to Bill Nelson, the FWO convenor, who collates the FWO records and passes them to me. Together we are able to maximise financial resources for the benefit of the church.

Safeguarding

Our congregational register for 2014 has been updated and handed over for attestation. We are delighted to tell you that David Young has now completed his training and has received his verifier code; he is now able to process PVG applications and has been added to the register as a coordinator.

Over the last few weeks we have been working to complete the PVG process for those who were still operating under Disclosure Scotland, the previous system and by the time you read this article, we anticipate the changeover will be complete, well ahead of the October deadline set by Edinburgh. There are thirty eight members of the congregation who are members of the PVG scheme, which means they have been cleared to work with young people and /or vulnerable adults, mainly Sunday Live staff, BB officers and the pastoral care team. As a congregation we are grateful to these volunteers for so willingly agreeing to comply with the procedures. Our next task will be to encourage all volunteers, who have not already done, so to attend a training event. Information will be made available through the Sunday Order of Service when training events are being held.

David and I were very disappointed to learn that a Safeguarding Roadshow for Hamilton Presbytery was cancelled due to lack of interest. As relatively new coordinators we both feel we would have benefited from such an event and have asked to be notified if a similar event is to be held nearby. In the meantime we will continue to do our best with the information available.

God's Gifts

Our society depends a great deal on lending and borrowing. Indeed our whole economy depends on lending and borrowing. The old saying "Neither a borrower nor a lender be" is not always helpful nor is it even true in practice. Lending can actually bring great blessings. When Jesus walked the earth he had nothing of his own in terms of ordinary possessions even though he was King of Kings and Lord of Lords. "*The Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head*" were his own words.
