Dear friends,

What, for you, makes church “church”?

Is it the building, the style of worship, or the friends? Certainly, these things all contribute to what we enjoy about coming together on a Sunday morning and on other occasions throughout the week and the year. There’s a warm familiarity to worshipping together in our place, even when we come across hymns with which we are less enthused. But public worship is merely one hour in the week. Is that what makes church “church”?

Undoubtedly, we know that the word church is better translated as congregation or people. However, there are other phrases in scripture that apply. The church is the bride of Christ. She is the people of God, not just in this generation but in every generation. I have made much of the continuity we have with our forebearers and those who will come after us. It is not difficult to set this within the context of our church buildings, which have been a house of worship to each generation of our families and we trust will continue so to do for many, many more. Yet, these generations are not the buildings and the buildings are not the people. They are just a convenient place to meet in warm, familiar camaraderie. The church has occasion to use such buildings for her use, as the season permits. What makes church “church”?

I am reminded of the words of the hymn (204), “You are the church, I am the church, we are the church together. All who follow Jesus, all around the world, yes, we’re the church together”. Depending on our personal theology, we might think of the children of God as either all of humankind or all Christians; or the people of God as either those who have a belief in God or specifically the Christian God. Similarly, we might think of Christians as those who live in a so-called Christian country, those who attend a church service, those who emulate Christ’s actions, or those who claim a living faith in God through Christ. Regardless, we may be comfortable in acknowledging that God knows His own, even if we cannot precisely identify what if any are the bounds of His recognition. Also, none of us are immune to some level of tribalism. What makes “church”?

Whatever goes through our heads, our hearts surely long to see health and growth in our community of faith. When our individual and collective faith is demonstrable, wherever we live and do business, there is an opportunity for each of us to respond to one another. That holds true whether we are enjoying the Palace Grounds, Chatelherault, Quarry Street, a drive in our car, time with neighbours, or worship in a church building. We provide a living testimony to what God is doing in the world, and what Christianity is doing, in particular. In faith, our interactions make us “church”. We are the church together.

I trust that, as winter gives way to spring and people emerge from hibernation just as the bulbs emerge from the ground, we might spare a consideration of how we might be “church” together, throughout all our intersecting communities.

CHRISTMAS SHOEBOX APPEAL 2018

Once again our Christmas Shoebox Appeal was an outstanding success and on Tuesday 6th November 2018 a fantastic total of 221 shoeboxes set off from 'The Old Parish' on their journeys to the hands of some very needy children across Eastern Europe, Africa and beyond.



I must confess as I watched the boxes being neatly stacked in the van I wondered where they would eventually end up and what the reaction would be from the children receiving them. When I prepared my shoebox I ticked the box asking to be informed of its eventual destination. However with so many shoeboxes involved from all over the UK and beyond I held out little hope of receiving much information. Perhaps you can imagine my surprise and delight when I received an email from Samaritan's Purse very recently telling me that my shoebox had been delivered to a child in Central Asia!! Let me share their message with you as it conveys their gratitude far better than I ever could.

"Dear Alison,

Your shoebox gift was one of 51,534 that has been delivered to children in Central Asia. We thank God for the thousands of children that have received shoeboxes here since Operation Christmas Child began distributions. Your shoebox gift is also helping build goodwill between peoples of different faiths. It was part of a distribution that local church groups made to children of all religious backgrounds in their community. However while political and religious sensitivities continue within Central Asia and for the safety of our ministry partners living in restricted areas, they have asked us not to disclose details about the specific country your shoebox was sent to. The power of your gift can be summed up by this comment from one of our local representatives:

'In very restricted environments local believers can't be out being vocal about their faith. Your shoebox becomes the key to a closed door and in remote areas where people have nothing and are dirt poor, this box gives them hope. This is love, true love and this opens the eyes of the people. Jesus said, 'I am the light of the world. He who follows me will not walk in darkness but will have the light that leads to life'. Through Operation Christmas Child God gave you the opportunity to penetrate the darkest places in this world.'"

May God bless you all at The Old Parish for your generosity and support.

Finance

At the time of writing, the 2018 accounts are being finalised and will be put to the Trustees on 12th March for approval before being presented to the congregation on 24th March.

I have just completed the Gift Aid claim for 2018 and unfortunately there has been a drop in the value of the claim. Although a few members increased their offerings during the year, the loss from deaths was greater. The total gift aided income was **£95,867.08** which will give us a refund of tax amounting to **£23,966.77**.

The table below shows a breakdown of the different elements included in the return along with the previous years' figures for comparison. The one-off donation received in 2018 was for the work of Drama Kirk.

At present we have 187 declarations in place representing 260 members. If you pay tax and would like to contribute extra to the church at no cost to yourself, please speak to me. For every £1.00 you contribute, HMRC will refund us 25p of the tax you have already paid. As ever if you stop paying tax or change your address please let me know.

I would like to take the opportunity to thank the people concerned with the finances of the congregation. The committee, for their support throughout the year especially Bill Nelson for keeping the WFO records and standing in when I am not available; Alan Blue who keeps the records and produces the accounts each year; the counting team for their dedication in counting the offerings every Monday morning and, of course, **YOU**, the congregation for your continued support of God's work in the church, locally and nationally.

Boys' Brigade Company Section



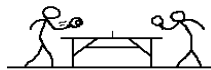
Battalion Badminton

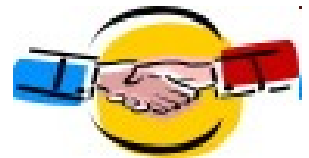

John Knox

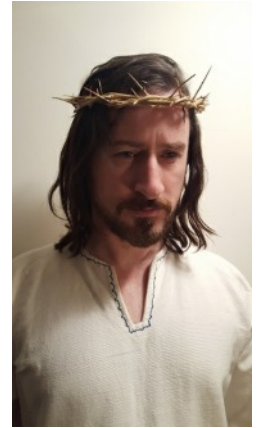
Even if we don't admit to it, most of us will occasionally stereotype certain people, races or professions. In the 19th century, John Knox was a folk hero. In the 20th century, he became a folk villain. In the 21st century, there are some signs that he is coming back in from the cold. In the meantime, here are a few facts:

1. Knox was no hater of women. Actually, he loved the company of women and was happily married. His diatribe against the “monstrous regimen of women” was directed against the rules of Queen Elizabeth of England and Mary Queen of Scots and certainly not women in general.
2. Knox was no kill-joy. His favourite recreation was going to the theatre.
3. Although he has been referred to as the “thundering Scots”. Knox actually spoke with an English accent.
4. In 1560, Knox introduced divorce into Scots Law giving equal rights of access to men and women, hundreds of years ahead of the position in England
5. Knox's dream was that there should be a school in every parish in Scotland, open to both boys and girls on an equal basis. This dream was not finally realised until the passing of the Education (Scotland) Act 1872.

The People's Passion

Rehearsals for this year's Passion Play are underway and I am delighted to tell you that Nicholas Elliott (pictured), who was so brilliant last year, is working with us again in the role of Jesus. Our wonderful community cast are drawn from local churches and are working hard on this new opportunity to take the gospel message out.



This year's script is a very different approach to a Passion Play. "The People's Passion" was devised by Riding Lights Theatre Company, based in York, who have a long history of supporting churches to use drama in worship. It is a wonderful mix of theatre and worship. My prayer is that you will enjoy being part of it as much as we are enjoying working on it.

This Passion Play is not simply an audience watching a performance. We are all part of His story and the script encourages us to see our own part in it. There are some responsive moments in the text where the congregation will join together as one voice, just as they did in the first century. There is also congregational singing at poignant moments in the action. This echoes what we have heard the minister say so often from the pulpit, **"We are not spectators. We are part of the story!"**.

You will meet many familiar characters who are pivotal in telling the story of that fateful week. There are new people too, including Mary, Martha and Lazarus. Isn't it wonderful that even in our third year, there are characters we have still to meet, each of whom have something fresh to tell us about Jesus?



Each church we visit will have an opportunity for mission through The People's Passion. Through fliers, press and social media, they can promote the performances in a way that can be challenging to promote a church service. Perhaps these performances will create for other towns the same buzz we experienced for the first time in Holy Week 2017, with increased attendance and engagement – and of course for usual attenders a new way to look at familiar events.

I remain grateful to those who help in so many ways in bringing the gospel to life, including our wonderful cast and crew and our supportive Kirk Session.

Although we have started rehearsals, there are still opportunities to be involved. Perhaps you, or someone you know, might like to be involved? Whether you could be in crowd scenes, or help backstage or even help with some of the many production tasks that happen before Holy Week, there is always something you can do to help. We would love to hear from you.

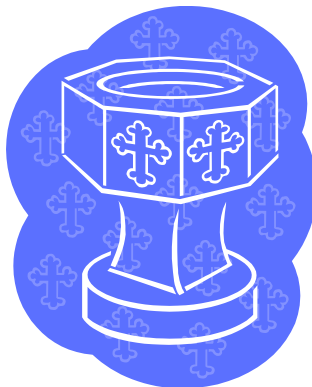
