Dear friends,

Sometimes it feels that the changing seasons affect the mind. What is your state of mind? With all the influences of life, including joys and tribulations, expectations and actual change, our state of mind can have a huge impact on how we view the world and act within it. Some face illness, bereavement, retirement, school, a new job, incident and accident, or any number of changes to their perspective or their role in life. Managing that change is not always easy and it can have an impact upon, and be impacted by, our state of mind.

I'm reminded of Rudyard Kipling's poem "If", which states:

If you can keep your head when all about you are losing theirs and blaming it on you, If you can trust yourself when all men doubt you, but make allowance for their doubting too; if you can wait and not be tired by waiting

Yours is the Earth and everything that's in it, and – which is more – you'll be a Man, my son!

The language is of its time, and I don't think is intended to be misogynistic, but does it place unrealistic expectations on its readers? After all, there are many reasons for struggling with our state of mind and not all of them have medical or stress-based causes. Some like Dr Sebastian Bailey talk of four states of mind that are externally and internally focussed; those that are harmful as well as those that are helpful. It's easy to run on autopilot, when familiarity turns to mundane, explaining in part the cause of so many car accidents close to home. On the other hand, being engaged with our environment and actively seeking other perspectives can be challenging but helpful. Similarly, when engaging in our own internal dialogue, it's useful to think deeply about things, but is detrimental if we become critical of ourselves and others. Indeed, we can be our own worst enemy when it comes to criticism.

From time to time we all face unexpected changes, place unhelpful expectations upon ourselves, and judge accordingly. Thank God, literally, that Christ does not view us as we see ourselves or even as others see us. Early in his ministry he declared, "for God did not send his Son into the world to be its judge but to be its saviour" (John 3:17). Rather, the judgement works by our response to His light (v19). And, that is worth thinking about and being engaged with. Whatever our state of mind, He is the source of peace (John 14:27).

It was a long day for them but they kept their heads down and ploughed on. Often when out in the hills it is as much about mental resilience as physical fitness. They eventually made it back to the campsite just before darkness fell. Overnight the weather was atrocious. The rain stotted down all night and by morning most of the tents were flooded and everyone was more than a little scunnered. However they collected their gear and walked the final stages of the route, albeit with stiff legs and Euan suffering from an ankle sprain the day before. It says a great deal for their character and determination that they saw the hike through to its end rather than calling it a day.

The session was brought to a close with the Old Kirk hosting the Lanarkshire District Fellowship Queen's Badge Presentation. The event brings together the boys from the four Battalions in the District who have gained their Queen's Badges, and is the most prestigious District event held each year. The Chief Guest was the Lord Lieutenant, Lady Haughey, and various other highheidyins attended the Presentation also, from The Boys' Brigade and beyond. By all accounts the Presentation went extremely well, to the extent the District has threatened to ask us to host the event again in the future. Mebbes aye. Mebbes naw ! There was a huge amount of work and time involved, and while technically the Kirk was the host, sincere thanks are due again from the Company to all who helped with the provision of the purvey, and to everyone who gave so willingly of their time and talents on the day itself.


One Good Friday

World Mission

By the end of 2018, United Mission to Nepal in their reconstruction work in Dhading district had achieved:

- 4516 students attending 36 newly constructed schools. 42 toilet blocks have been built at the schools.
- 37km of footpaths, 8km of paved roads and 8 bridges have been rebuilt.
- 8 micro-hydropower plants repaired to generate electricity.
- 55 communities, schools and health posts have access to safe drinking water and 358 toilets have been constructed. 222 water filters have been installed in schools and 57 water testing units have been established to monitor the water quality.
- 3411 students and teachers have been trained in caring for the water supply and the importance of good hygiene and sanitation.
- 217people have been trained to serve in 17 local government committees.
- 2014 people have been trained on issues of child protection, gender-based violence and child marriage.

Walk with the Word: Exodus

11



On Saturday 10th August Drama Kirk led a guided walk with a difference, as a cast and crew brought to bring to life the plight of Moses and the Israelites in the desert – well, in Chatelherault Park!

Our prayers were answered and the weather was extremely kind to us. We led three walks on a route of about a mile, lasting an hour, each with an audience of around 50. We had a cast of just over twenty, including two professional actors. We also built our own Ark of the Cov-

enant to what is thought to be the right dimensions. People really enjoyed the experience of marching behind it.

A storyteller led us through the time in the wilderness, starting with the parting of the red sea. Our scenes included God providing manna and quails, Moses getting the ten commandments, Aaron making the golden calf, spies entering Canaan, snakes attacking the camp and then - finally - entering the promised land. God (in the guise of Jim Henderson's wonderful voice) guided the Israelites throughout.



Feedback from our audience has been very positive, with people enjoying the surroundings, walking together as a group and the sense of being part of the story. Comments included, "It's a great way to communicate with all ages. Overheard children fascinated by the story and how big and great God is! All actors contributed a lot to making the story come alive and so believable (which it is!) and underlines the truth that God's Word is Alive and active! Narrator was humorous my daughter says!! Also I was pretty impressed with God's Voice and technology behind that and The Ark, so well done with that, costumes and props".

It was also another good opportunity to share our work with others. There was a lovely piece in Life and Work, Photo and blurb on the homepage of the Church of Scotland website, social media responses from London and Paris and (closer to home) good coverage in the Advertiser.

"Walk with the Word" is a planned series of walking events as part of our GoForIt funded project; where participants will have the opportunity to walk with well-known bible characters and discover more of their journey. Next summer we hope to bring you "Walk with the Word: Emmaus". In 2021 we will travel with Paul.

Many thanks and hearty congratulations to all involved – cast, crew, stewards and everyone supporting this ministry.

After a busy, but good six months in Scotland, we are now back home in sunny Sao Paulo. Possibly a bit too sunny for comfort.

We are just about settled back in after having a ten-day missionary training week with Action Brasil, then our annual ABBA retreat. Both went really well. The training week was full of meetings and long conversations with new candidates and a number of lectures, and after everything, five new missionaries have been accepted into the mission! It is very exciting to see people dedicating their lives to God's calling. The ABBA retreat was more a time of rest with worship time and a Bible study in the morning, then free time to spend time with the team in a very informal environment. A great time to catch up and share with people about our time in Scotland.

The children are back at school, and now me and Silvana have a few days to breathe a bit. Since getting back, it has all been a big rush, and we've hardly seen each other. So we have been spending time in the garden, weeding flower beds, I still haven't got round to hacking into our vegetable patch, as it has been growing for six months!! Our hens are coming back home this week also, so that'll be nice to have good healthy fresh eggs again, and cockerels singing at stupid o'clock, but that's ok! Our toucan family is back again and are nesting in our garden. It is a real blessing to sit back and watch the mother and father taking care of their young.

We start back with the children at Casa Semear next week, and we are really looking forward to sharing God's love with whoever we come across. Remember, it's not just the children we minister to. We (you too) all have to share with whoever He puts in our paths. We have a meeting with our team this week to plan our year ahead, and to discuss a few changes, and new ideas.

SERVICES, CAMPS, GROUPS, MOVING HOUSE AND A WEDDING.

The first half of this year came with many blessings. We have managed to get the services up and running again at Casa Semear with the help of an American minister and his Brazilian wife. They are hoping to open a church within the community and they are using Casa Semear as a base. They are taking care of the services, and have a kid's club beforehand along with visitation in the favela. We are really happy with this, as it has given us a great opportunity to spend time as a family at the weekends. Our two boys have been going to our church's youth group on Saturday nights, and are fully engaged with the young folk there. When we came back to Brazil last year, Vinny and Rafa were wanting to be baptized, so they done the baptismal course and were baptized at the church youth camp in June!

We had a group come from Ohio, in June, and they were with us for just under a week. It was a youth group from a Mennonite church and they helped lay tile on the top of the Volunteers flats (Laundry Area). We had intended on laying tile since it was built, but the funds only arrived after a silent auction here in Sao Paulo. The group helped with the tile laying, children's club and with a day camp on the Saturday. It was a BUSY week!

We had a bittersweet feeling last month as we had to say goodbye to one of the women that served with us at Casa Semear. We had been praying for a long time for the Lord to send her a husband, and God answered our prayers. Hallelujah! God is good! But it meant saying goodbye after six years of faithful service. She asked me to take the wedding, which was a real privilege. After the wedding, Jai moved away to a different city, and we pray for the Lords blessings over her life.

We have moved house! After being in Scotland last year, and having everything nearby, we decided to move back to our own house in town. With the children being more involved in church activities and after school activities, being closer has helped a lot. We don't have as much space, but it is ours, and we are happy. It was hard giving up the green and trees and nature, but now we have moved, life has been less stressful. Less driving.

A new school year has started, Vinny is now in High School, and is loving being in a different league to his siblings. He thinks he is really cool. Rafa just can't stand school, but that is him. Marianne is enjoying school and turns 10 this month, seems like 16, but only 10!

God bless!! Robert, Silvana, Vinny, Rafael, Marianne and Helena!
















Almighty God, help us to rest in you.
