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Dear friends,

“Home is Where the Heart is”

Very few people manage to live in a single home throughout their entire lives. Even the marital home might be exchanged as the family grows or as circumstances change. Some opt for an extension or a loft conversion, they change the kitchen or bathroom, and they certainly keep the décor fresh. They may downsize, and wonder which furniture to keep or otherwise dispose of. It is usually precipitated by changing times and changing needs. Fortunately, home is where the heart is.

Another thing that can feel like “home” to us is our church. We tend to think of our institutions, especially the church, as being unchanging; even though we understand that everything has to change with the times. One of the biggest changes for our own denomination in recent times has been Presbytery Mission Planning, as it strove to downsize the portfolio of buildings owned by the church and with the drive for “Well Equipped Spaces in the Right Places”. It has, to be frank, caused disarray and dismay up and down the country and at times felt a little arbitrary. Even the threat of the potential closure of a cherished building has caused many to break out in a cold sweat. It can feel like a threat!

This is compounded when it's combined with the Union of a congregation, with the commensurate need to make new friends and discover fresh vantage points as our usual seats or pews change. In this regard, our own congregation and town has been incredibly fortunate in that the Unions of the last 60 years have been both amicable and reviving for all parties.

However, it doesn't come without cost, acknowledged grief, and further change. This is especially the case if we keep an eye to the future and what our congregation is going to need and what the General Assembly through Presbytery might demand. We are, of course, talking about flexible spaces that can be utilised more than on a Sunday for worship, that supports the extension of God's mission in our town, while also dealing sensitively with our buildings.

A quick history of the Hamilton Old Parish church building is worth reviewing: After the Collegiate Church of 1450 was demolished to make way for extensions to Hamilton Palace, the present Parish church was built in 1734. In short order, the lighting had to be improved by a significant redesign of the roof to incorporate a cupola. Pews were the next to be added, and charged for sitting upon! At the turn of the 20th century, an organ was added to the upper rear of the church, before a radical redesign of the interior to incorporate the pulpit and choir stalls into a new organ casing necessitated the removal of one set of pulpit stairs and a reduction in the all-round balcony. This was further eventful when the Duke of Hamilton lost the right to sit where he wanted in a famous court case that went all the way to the House of Lords. The only further change to the outside aspect was the re-siting of the Netherton Cross in 1925.

During the ministry of Dr Wyllie, the choir stalls were removed to improve the chancel area, also resulting in the removal of some detail of the side pews, though the umbrella stands on the end of each pew and the top hat storage underwires were retained. Ten years ago the sound desk was enlarged and screens, cameras, and lighting were discreetly added, which was providential given ensuing Lockdown. Several town war memorials were also re-homed.

We are now being asked to sympathetically create a more flexible area at the front of the sanctuary by replacing three rows of pews. This will widen the scope of use and provide some necessary comfort to those who cannot sit on pews, including wheelchair users, and for brides wishing to be walked down at least some of the aisle. We have yet to be challenged about the lack of wheelchair access to the chancel, so the building is not yet futureproofed.

Similarly, the conditions upon which we were granted the continued use of the West buildings included a mission and business case for the removal of the side pews and chancel area to give full disabled access and flexibility for missional use and a wide variety of performances, while retaining the pulpit and organ for worship. Fortunately and unexpectedly, it was discovered that the pulpit is already on castors!

For some folk, this has been anticipated. For others it will be a surprise. In the midst of such change, we are perhaps reminded that while God is unchanging and the only constant in our lives, change and re-creation are inevitable. In ancient Israel he stated, “Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert.” (ESV Isa.43:19). This would prophetically herald the arrival of Christ, and the way that he overturned times and seasons, in religion and faith. In turn, he led us to an age that continues to contain daily challenges but in which we are assured of our eternal destiny. It led to worship in fields, catacombs, and eventually cathedrals and churches. However, for all the disconcerting changes that society has faced, and the church with it, it is still good to be able to say that home is where the heart is – and to be with Christ and his people is home indeed.

Inevitably, the need for change can be both exciting and unsettling in equal measure, even when it tastefully and sympathetically accommodates our individual and collective needs as well as our existing or preferred styles. It can also take a little while to come to terms with things. Consequently, in regard to the proposed building works, larger versions of these pictures are available from the church office and I would be delighted to discuss it further.

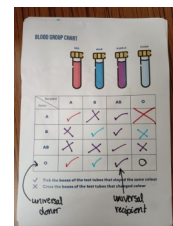
Wednesday Night Junior Section

The Wednesday Junior Section have had a fantastic second term, and are now looking forward to the wind down before summer!

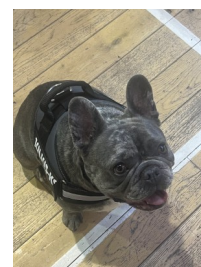

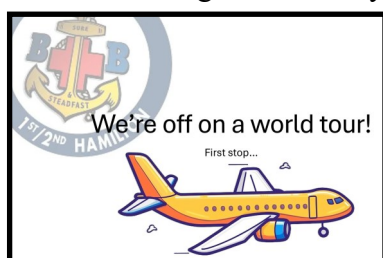

'Everything in His Hands' Passion Play 2026

Well, our plans for a large-scale outdoor play to celebrate Drama Kirk' tenth annual Passion Play didn't quite go according to plan. It certainly wasn't the Passion Play Wot Went Wrong, but it definitely tested our conviction that everything was indeed in His hands.

We always keep a close eye on the weather forecast, especially from a safety perspective. Whilst we've had cold, wet uncomfortable weather conditions in the past, we've never had to face dangerous conditions, like we did this year. High winds were forecast and - by the Thursday of Holy Week - were predicted to hit 40 miles an hour by 4pm, around the time we'd have been doing the crucifixion. Plan B was required!

We'd been keeping in touch with the local Business Improvement District manager, Malcolm, throughout the week, as Storm Dave was starting to brew. With the plans for the Easter gala day and market stalls, it made most sense for us to follow their plans, meaning that by Thursday morning we knew we were looking for an alternative venue. We were very keen to keep the link to BID and use a community venue, having performed in church the past two years. With Malcolm's help, we were able to secure the former WH Smith site, which - without shelves and stationery - was absolutely massive and perfect for our purposes. Many thanks to Malcolm and to the Regent Centre.

We did have several adjustments to make, including shortening the cross and building a false wall to allow our actors to get off stage. Huge thanks are due to everyone who helped with what was a massive undertaking. Thank you!

The play went ahead and I think the cast and crew are to be very much congratulated for a wonderful performance. I believe I can reliably say it was the best Passion Play ever performed in a stationers (but I am happy to stand corrected!). The turnout was excellent and we were delighted with the level of support. It was wonderful to have some new cast and crew members join us, and to see people perform in new roles. Stuart Davidson took on the role of John for the first time and brought a fantastic energy to the character.



Reflecting on the changes, we feel that the adaptations we were able to make at the last minute were only possible because of the commitment, talent and experience of the team. We are so delighted that so many of the Drama Kirk family have stuck with us over the years. Please do keep the team in your prayers and we are grateful to everyone who supports our work.

Since Easter, we've continued our series of miracles at the West services. We performed the healing of Peter's mother-in-law at the April service and will continue to explore the miracles for the next few services. We've found a lovely way to end that wee series - watch this space!!

Our Passion Play for 2027 will be 'CHOOSE LIFE' and planning is underway. Our steering group will meet in May to discuss this and I'm sure we've now learned the lesson that, no matter how well we plan, everything is truly in His hands and He knows best!
